## **How to Identify Boxwood Blight**

Boxwoods are a genus of around 90+ species within the Buxaceae family, with new varieties hitting the market every year. They are broadleaf evergreen shrubs that are a staple of many landscapes and grow in a variety of climates. Used as foundation plantings, hedges, and more, they require part or full sun depending on yearly climate for optimal growth.

Boxwoods are typically low maintenance, unless they are used as a formal hedge and need regular shearing. However, they can become diseased, most commonly with blight and Phytophthora. These diseases can look similar. Use our guide below to help identify boxwood blight.



#### **Identifying Boxwood Blight**

Boxwood blight is a fungal disease caused by Calonectria pseudonaviculata and C. henricotiae that affects Buxus, Pachysandra and Sarcococca genuses. Research states a wide range of boxwood cultivars are susceptible to boxwood blight, but the most susceptible species are B. sempervirens with Buxus sempervirens 'Suffruticosa' (English boxwood) and Buxus sempervirens 'American' (common or American boxwood) topping the list.

Originally discovered in the United Kingdom in the 1990's, boxwood blight came to the United States in 2011. This disease has now been found in 23 states. As shown in the image on the opposite page, it significantly impacts the plant's aesthetics and eventually kills it. Symptoms include leaf spot, rapid defoliation, severe dieback, and black cankers on stems. Circular leaf spots appear before leaf blighting, and the spots often look brown or purple. You may also notice dark brown or black stem lesions. In areas of high humidity, you might notice white fuzzy masses of spores on stems and leaves, but this is less common. It can take over quickly during wet periods and can go dormant in warmer and drier conditions, only to reappear when the weather changes.

#### **Avoiding Blight**

The fungal spores can last over 10 years in the soil. They stick to anything exposed to the infected plant, such as gloves, tools, equipment, tires, clothes, and more. Some states, such as Pennsylvania, Virginia, and Tennessee now have Boxwood Compliance Agreements to abate this infectious disease. The agreements contain strict protocols for boxwood shipping and care.

To limit infection, you should follow these guidelines:

- Make sure to purchase boxwood from reputable suppliers.
- Water the plant roots (not leaves) in the morning, as evenings can have low temperatures and fungus thrives on wet leaves.

- Clean your tools in a 10% bleach solution after pruning different blocks of plants. Use a fresh solution after each job.
- Properly dispose of any infected plants, typically by burning the plant on-site.
- Do not work in landscape beds when the plants
- Consider using mulch around boxwoods to prevent water splash onto leaves, keeping them drier.
- Wash off shoes and clothing between landscaping jobs, especially in areas noted to have boxwood blight.
- Apply preventative fungicides regularly in areas noted to have boxwood blight.

If you suspect boxwood blight, quarantine the plants as soon as possible. Gather sample stems and leaves and take pictures. Take these pictures into your local SiteOne Nursery or your local state extension office to discuss your next steps and to inform them of the disease in the area.


If boxwood blight is prevalent in your area, consider asking your customer to choose a boxwood variety that is more resistant, such as Portfolio® Little Missy, Green Gem, Winter Gem, or Dee Runk. Other alternative



plants are Ilex glabra and Ilex crenata, which mimic the boxwood look without the disease pressures.

Monitor your clients' plants when doing preventative maintenance and pruning to avoid costly spread of disease.

## The Six B's Of Staffing

An insightful business owner from Kansas called me the other day to discuss the shortterm and long-term staffing issues confronting her growing, company. successful While the conversation began with the standard topics addressing recruitment, interviewing, and selection practices pertinent support her company's ambitious growth, I expanded the scope of discussion by introducing the 6 B's of Talent Management (Ulrich, 1997).

Given current labor shortages, it is incumbent upon owners, managers, and staffing professionals to expand their orthodox mindset beyond the conventional to a more comprehensive set of alternatives.

include: Internet practices recruiting, accessing previouslyfiled job applicants, leveraging employee networks/affinity groups to reach out to targeted communities, employee referrals, keeping in contact with and rehiring former employees, client involvement in recruitment and hiring processes, and positioning the organization as an "employer choice," by building, developing and maintaining employer brands and employee value propositions.

This orientation is intended to extend a business owner's awareness across vertical, horizontal, and temporal dimensions as a multi-lateral paradigm to better address employee talent management resources fundamental to meeting ongoing business goals. That said, all six of the following options should always be considered when facing any type of staffing need.

**Buy:** Acquiring the necessary employees by recruiting them from outside the organization. Some best

**Build:** Developing internal talent to fill future staffing vacancies. Some best practices include: Internal training programs, coaching and mentoring, offering on-thejob growth and development opportunities including special projects and job rotation, stretch assignments like learning estimating skills, overseeing different work teams, and aligning their growth with a career ladder.

**Borrow:** Contracting, outsourcing, or bringing in other labor sources. When conducting succession planning, it helps to look at capabilities both from a long-term and shorter-term perspective. Once you've identified any capabilities you may need in the next 12 months, but not necessarily far into the future, you may want to consider outsourcing or using external labor sources to satisfy this short-term strategic need. A short-term application would include the H2B Visa program for field workers.

**Bind:** Retaining those employees with high growth potential and valued talent. This aspect addresses the identification and retention of the company's most important and high-potential employees. The emphasis here is to cultivate an inextricable bond between the

organization's culture and the valued employee to sustain continued employment. Key practices include: employee engagement, access to managerial/ executive level decision processes, and a 12-18 month development plan blending anticipated skill sets with employee growth aspirations.

**Bend:** Modifying a position or employee's role to fill a staffing need. In this situation, the job description can be temporarily expanded to allow an employee to serve a broader-based function, or the employee's role is altered such that s/he is asked to perform extra duties beyond normal expectations. This instance may include a Foreman bending his position to include additional irrigation, plant health care, or safety responsibilities until a full-time replacement is found.

**Bounce:** Removing low-performing or underperforming individuals. Examples of this practice include: terminations, early retirements, layoffs, severance packages, outplacement services, and restructuring or downsizing existing organizational departments, services, and redundancies. By eliminating these impediments, the company is now in command of additional fiscal assets capable of being applied to other staffing options mentioned above (e.g., training, pay raises, resources).

Given current labor shortages, it is incumbent upon owners, managers, and staffing professionals to expand their orthodox mindset beyond the conventional to a more comprehensive set of alternatives.
